What's Been Happening


Group member, Alan Williams spoke to a well-attended coffee morning in November on 'Meldreth Cottages - Then and Now'. Alan shared his detailed knowledge of how some of the village's oldest buildings have evolved over the centuries. Thanks go to him for an interesting and informative presentation.

At last year's Service of Remembrance at [Meldreth's War Memorial](#), Group Chair Joan Gane laid a wreath, hand-made by Anna Taylor. This was the first time the Group had been invited to do this, in recognition of the work it has done on the [war years in Meldreth](#) and on those who served in both world wars.

At the the annual Christmas Tree Festival at Meldreth's [Holy Trinity Church](#), MLHG contributed a tree decorated as it might have been during the Second World War. It drew very favourable comments and thanks go to everyone who helped decorate it.

Group members continue their research into a number of topics, for example, the village's historic buildings (see photo), street names and parish records from the 1670s - 1870s, held at the [Cambridge University Library](#).

While we can't meet or work in the usual way we have some suggestions of things you might like to do:

1. Familiarise yourself with our [website](#): 670 pages
2. Look at our other website: <https://meldreth.ccan.co.uk/>
3. Write your memories of the village or research an aspect of Meldreth's history
4. Research your Meldreth ancestors
5. Write an account of what life is like in Meldreth during the pandemic or send us any photos you have taken of the village during this period
6. Take a free online course in genealogy (or another subject) with futurelearn.com

And some resources to use (free or with free trials):

1. [Boredom Busters](#) from the National Archives. National Archives are also offering free access to their digitised records during lockdown: nationalarchives.gov.uk/about/news/digital-downloads/
2. familysearch.org - LDS website offering genealogical records. Free of charge.
3. Free index for birth, marriage and death records in the UK from 1837-1992. freebmd.org.uk
4. Look out for free weekends with ancestry.co.uk or sign up for a free 14 day trial with them or findmypast.co.uk. There are lots of social history records on both sites and FMP includes access to the British Newspaper Archive.
5. If you are a member of [Cambridgeshire Libraries](#), you can access ancestry.co.uk through their website at the moment free of charge. E-editions of some magazines (including family history and history titles) are also available free of charge from Cambridgeshire Libraries.
6. Browse or search the [Cambridgeshire Archives online catalogue](#).
7. Cambridge University's [Institute of Continuing Education](#) (ICE) has virtual open days and topical talks.
